1 Course/Subject introduction

Throughout the year a series of units are delivered that will develop the Head of Department: for success and progression in Key stage 3. Alongside this, opportunitie explore and discover drama in a variety of ways and activities. All pup regularly given the opportunity to reflect and review on their learning Number of lessons per of retrieval activities that develop retention skills and build on confider fortnight for KS3: 2 component areas in Drama. The Year 7 course acts as an 'Introduction to Drama as

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many pupils will have limited experience of this subject from Primary school. It provides pupils with the essential building blocks of vocal and physical performance skills to allow them to develop and progress throughout KS3. Pupils will also develop essential life skills such as: communication skills; teamwork; problem solving; leadership ability etc.

	Pupils will begin Year 7 with an 'Introduction to Drama'. They will
Term 1	learn key skills such as: still image, thought track, mime, role play,
	physical theatre, narration and spontaneous improvisation.
	In the second half of the term they will develop these skills further
	exploring techniques such as: problem solving, devising, soundscaping,
	vocal control, speaking to persuade, narration and storytelling.
Term 2	Pupils will study 'advertising'. They will create their own adverts,
	developing their understanding of how advertisers sell products eg. Use
	of persuasive language and techniques, target audience, media
	manipulation etc.
	Pupils will then explore Shakespeare. They will study two plays –
	'Romeo and Juliet' and 'Macbeth' both from a practical performance

	view, and will also look at costume and make-up design.
	Pupils will study a full play script – 'The Terrible Fate of Humpty
	Dumpty'. This play explores a central theme of bullying and the
Term 3	negative consequences. This will involve reading the script, watching
	the play, acting out scenes, studying characterisation, plot structure,
	context, lighting, costume, sound and set design.

Formal assessments will take place throughout the year in the form of half termly formative practical assessments. After each formal assessment all pupils will be given in-depth feedback that celebrates areas of success and helps identify areas for future development.

skills developed in year 7 and to ensure that pupils are able to achieve the best possible outcome in GCSE Drama, should they choose it as an option at KS4. Pupils will also develop essential life skills such as: communication skills; teamwork; problem solving; leadership ability etc.

	Pupils will begin Year 8 exploring all forms of media and concepts such
	as target audiences, media manipulation and persuasive speech. They
	will explore this in a variety of forms including: advertising, news
Term 1	reports, reality TV etc.
	Pupils will then explore the technique of devising (creating) a group
	performance based on a stimulus. They will also be introduced to the
	theatrical style of 'non-naturalistic theatre'.
	Pupils will explore a range of different styles and genres of theatre,
	developing their understanding of the key aspects of each genre. This
Term 2	will include: mime, melodrama, commedia dell'arte and soap opera.
	Pupils will then explore the technique of devising (creating) a group
	performance based on a stimulus. They will devise from a range of
	stimuli including: photographs, poetry, music and props.

Term 3

Pupils will study a full play script – 'Our Day Out'. A Liverpool based script by local playwright – Willy Russell. This will involve reading the script, watching the play, acting out scenes, studying characterisation, plot structure, context, lighting, costume, sound and set design.

Formal assessments will take place throughout the year in the form of half termly formative practical assessments. After each formal assessment all pupils will be given in-depth feedback that celebrates areas of success and helps identify areas for future development.

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component areas in Drama. The Year 9 course provides the opportunity to refine the

skills developed in years 7 and 8 and to ensure that pupils are able to achieve the best possible outcome in GCSE Drama, should they choose it as an option at KS4. Pupils will also develop essential life skills such as: communication skills; teamwork; problem solving; leadership ability etc.

	Pupils will begin Year 9 with an 'Introduction to KS4 Drama' involving
Term 1	team building, improvisation, role play, physical and vocal skills.
	Engaging in skills and techniques they will use if they continue to study
	Drama at KS4.
	Pupils will then explore Monologues/Duologues – They will watch
	examples and then begin to script their own pieces. They will explore
	characterisation in terms of vocal and physical skills, culminating in an
	assessed performance.
Term 2	Pupils will explore the technique of devising (creating) a group
	performance based on a stimulus. They will also be introduced to the
	theatrical concept of 'status' and 'subtext' and how they can
	communicate this on stage.
	Finally pupils will explore use of non-naturalistic techniques in theatre

	including: Narration, chorus, split screen, spoken conscience, slow
	motion, counter-pointing, physical theatre etc.
Term 3	Pupils will study a full play script – 'Blood Brothers'. A Liverpool based
	script, by local playwright – Willy Russell. This will involve reading the
	script, watching the play, acting out scenes, studying characterisation,
	plot structure, context, lighting, costume, sound and set design. Pupils
	will continue to study 'Blood Brothers' in both KS4 Drama and English.
	This term introduces them to the play in a practical exploration.

Formal assessments will take place throughout the year in the form of half termly formative practical assessments. After each formal assessment all pupils will be given in-depth feedback that celebrates areas of success and helps identify areas for future development.

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component areas in Drama. The Year 10 course provides the opportunity to refine the

skills developed at key stage 3 to ensure that pupils are able to achieve the best possible outcome in their GCSE Drama exam and develop essential life skills such as: communication skills; teamwork; problem solving; leadership ability etc.

Term 1	Pupils will begin the GCSE Drama course with an 'Introduction to KS4
	Drama' involving team building, improvisation, role play, physical and
	vocal skills.
	Pupils will then explore Section 1 of their written exam –
	Understanding Theatre. This includes: Staging positions, staging
	configurations and roles and responsibilities within the theatre.
	Finally pupils will study Component 3 – Response to Live Theatre . This
	involves the pupils seeing a piece of live theatre and evaluating this in a
	written response.
Term 2	Pupils will begin to study their set text – 'Blood Brothers'. This will
	involve reading the script, watching the play, acting out scenes,
	studying characterisation, plot structure, context, lighting, costume,
	sound and set design. Pupils will have to answer 4 questions on 'Blood
	Brothers' in their final exam. Pupils will then begin Component 2 –

	Devising (Responding to a stimulus). This is where pupils will work in
	groups to create their own original performance. Alongside this pupils
	will complete their coursework which documents the process of
	creating, rehearsing and performing their piece.
Term 3	Pupils will continue to develop and refine their group pieces,
	culminating in a filmed and assessed performance. Pupils will also
	complete the draft of their coursework (Devising log) 40%.
	Pupils will also complete a mock written exam in this term.

Formal assessments will take place throughout the year in the form of mock examinations. Pupils will be given opportunities to develop revision skills and exam techniques in order to help build strategies to develop resilience. All unit tests and formal assessments follow the format of the AQA specification in order for pupils to become familiar with the layout and marking criteria at GCSE level. After each formal assessment all pupils will be given in-depth feedback that celebrates areas of success and help identify areas for future development.

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Number of lessons per fortnight for KS4: 6 component areas in Drama. The Year 11 course provides the opportunity to refine the

skills developed at key stage 3 and in Year 10 to ensure that pupils are able to achieve the best possible outcome in their GCSE Drama exam and develop essential life skills such as: communication skills; teamwork; problem solving; leadership ability etc.

Term 1	Completion of Component two – Devising . Pupils will have completed their devising performances and will be refining and improving their devising logs (coursework) 40%. Pupils will then begin rehearsing for Component 3 – Scripted pieces .
	Pupils will perform two extracts from a published script of their choice 20%.
Term 2	Completion of Component 3 – Scripted pieces. Pupils will perform and
(1 st half term)	be assessed by an outside examiner for their two extracts.
Term 2 & 3	At this point pupils should have completed the full specification and each class teacher will produce half termly plans based on mock exam analysis specific to each class and pupil. This will include coverage of all sections of the written exam (Component 1 40%) Section 1: Understanding Theatre; Section 2: Blood Brothers; Section 3: response to Live Theatre.

Formal assessments will take place throughout the year in the form of mock examinations. Pupils will be given opportunities to develop revision skills and exam techniques in order to help build strategies to develop resilience. All unit tests and formal assessments follow the format of the AQA specification in order for pupils to become familiar with the layout and marking criteria at GCSE level.
