Year 8 students have been completing their culture projects on 'Día De Los Muertos' this term, with a focus on different cultures and festivals, pattern and colour. This has included designing sugar skulls and learning how to print and create a repeat, printed pattern.

Students have also been experimenting with mark making and colour mixing, as well as exploring the style of the impressionists and studying some of the main artists and the impact they had on the art world.

We are delighted to let you know that students have taken part in a ceramics workshop with a visiting ceramics artist, some of these pieces are set to go on display in the new Shakespeare theatre!

BUSINESS

Year 10 are currently exploring local businesses and have been looking at ownership types, competition in the area and the characteristics of the people who run the SMEs. This has included assignments that look in detail at specific case studies which will form part of their BTEC Enterprise qualification.

Students will then go on to do some primary research into the business and evaluate whether the business will be a success or not. This will include looking at SWOT and PESTLE analysis to decide what internal and external factors help inform businesses to make decisions.



CAREERS

This term the Careers Department has been extremely busy!

We started the term with in-school college interviews for our Year 11s. This experience not only helped students to secure their places in college, but provided valuable interview practice for those still unsure about their next steps.

In February, we held our 'Working Lives Day' as part of our PSHE and Careers curriculum, which provided the chance for students to take part in a wide range of activities around the theme of careers.

Students in Year 7 and 8 utilised our staff expertise to learn about how different careers link to their subject specialisms. Students in Year 9 then used this knowledge to talk about their GCSE option choices, whilst students in Year 10 logged in to 'Unifrog' to start looking at college places and apprenticeships.

Year 11 were lucky enough to have a workshop delivered by 'Maximise' where they took part in activities designed to teach them different revision methods and other ways to maximise their potential. All in all, a very productive day!

This term is obviously an extremely important one for

our Year 11s, as the exams creep ever closer. The Careers Department has worked tirelessly to ensure that every single student has had careers interviews and feels fully supported to make their next steps after GCSEs.

Applications have all now been made and interviews have either taken place or are happening within the next few weeks. I would urge anyone in Year 11 to chat with Mrs Haigh or Mrs Robinson about any questions or concerns, our team are here to make this transition to further education as smooth as possible.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

YEAR 7

In the first half of the spring term, students in Year 7 looked at the people who have influenced computing in different ways. This included finding out more about people such as Charles Babbage and Ada Lovelace, Alan Turing and Mary Jackson, as well as Katherine Johnson and Dorothy Vaughan who helped to calculate trajectories for the Apollo space missions in the 1960's.

Over the last few weeks, students have been introduced to using spreadsheets and the concept of cells and formulae. This includes collecting and analysing data and manipulating the data, as well as creating bar charts, pie charts and line graphs using the data. Students will also look at formatting their spreadsheets and creating formulae such as: =sum, =countif, =max, =min, =average. We will look at how "data is becoming the oil of our digital world".

YEAR 10

During the spring term, our Year 10's have continued to build on their knowledge in the Computer Science subject. Our current topic is on Networks, with a focus on grasping the concepts of topology, architecture and elements that can affect performance. To make their learning transferrable to the real world around us, our students can suggest appropriate network solutions in different scenarios and highlight potential problems that may be occurring in a network.


We have also been working on cementing this knowledge by reviewing past exam questions, exploring what the question is asking and how to answer it effectively.

DRAMA

In Drama, Year 11 students have rehearsed and performed their final exam pieces. They have had the option to choose either a monologue or duologue. This has provided the freedom for students to explore their chosen script and character and hone their skills as performers.

This was their final practical performance for their GCSE course, and they have really risen to the challenge, rehearsing in class, staying after school and learning lines at home. They have had a challenging time throughout the course with Covid interrupting many performances. However, they have all shown true resilience and we're sure they impressed the examiner with their final pieces.

The Drama Department is incredibly proud of every student!





PRODUCT DESIGN

Our Year 9 students have been focusing on green issues in our new enterprise recycling project. This has included collecting, sorting and then recycling bottle tops through our melting process and re-purposing the new formed plastic into keyrings and other new items - from coasters to mini plant pots - with a focus on the importance of recycling for the environment.

Students have also been learning to solder and complete an electronic mood lamp circuit, which involves learning about electronic components and

their purpose. On completion of their LED circuit board, the students have designed and made a mood lamp from recycled materials.

While in Year 10, students have been working on developing key core skills focusing on their mini lamp project, this project helps students to learn about time management, development of technical drawing skills and the use CAD / CAM alongside practical manufacturing of joints, machine process and building on technical skills and key knowledge.

FOOD

In Food Technology, Year 9 students have been working on a project entitled 'Diet Through Life'. They have recapped their basic nutrition knowledge and looked at how to apply that to the different life stages from pregnancy to old age.

In addition to this, students have been developing practical skills and producing more complex dishes. We have made some delicious homemade pizza - practising kneading, pastry dishes such as quiche - to develop skills such as weighing and measuring, rubbing in and knife skills. Students have even learnt how to make the family favourite, Spaghetti Bolognese, which is a staple for any student planning on going to university in future years.



ENGLISH

Having spent last term reading and analysing Dickens' A Christmas Carol and Russell's Blood Brothers, Year 10 have moved on to English language skills. This course is the second one GCSE students will complete in English and will provide them with the skills they need to show colleges and future employers that they are competent readers and writers.

Students are finding that the work they have done in literature supports their analysis of unseen language texts. It is a pleasure to see the students so motivated and engaged in lessons. They have been taking on challenges such as: completing past papers, writing for purpose, and writing creatively. We particularly love reading their creative stories, which often evoke a wide range of emotions!

Here are some excerpts from stories they have written...

I sank to my knees and wondered will this ever end? As tears threatened to spill, my body weakened, my eyes overflowed with salty waters. I slumped to the floor, my lips trembling. Time dragged as the second hand crept between each line on the clock. In English, time usually dances by – not today. What once was a classroom shrunk to a tiny cell. Imprisoned in my own thoughts, here in a heap on the floor, I asked myself again: when will it all end?

In a cold, damp, isolated room, the girl sank to her knees. Bright blood shot eyes stared at the floor in despair. No joy...

No hope...

No love -

- only misery.

The room seemed to close in like the booby-trapped trash compactor in Star Wars. Her heart pounded as the room as the secret she kept buried fed on her soul, like a Sarlacc with a huge maw and voracious appetite for pain.

HUMANITIES

This term in Humanities, Year 9 students have really focused on the values of Integrity and Appreciation.

In Geography, students have begun to look at the awesome power of the Earth through the study of volcanoes and earthquakes. They have also appreciated the challenges facing other countries through the study of India and particularly the mega city of Mumbai.

This term also saw the anniversary of the birthdate of Martin Luther King. Students have studied how Martin Luther King conducted himself with integrity during his protests for the rights of Black People. Students have also examined religion and conflict and begun to find out more different non-traditional religions such as Paganism and the Rastafarian religion.

We have also marked the annual Holocaust Memorial Day. In History, students have studied the events leading up to and the consequences of the Holocaust, they have conducted themselves in a mature and respectful way and have gained insights into the tragic events of this dark time in world history.

MATHS

The spring term marked the completion of the scheme of work and intervention material for Year 11 (based on the areas of weakness identified by the Question Level Analysis for the December mock). Revision material was sent home with students before half term in preparation for further mock exams, which are currently being marked.


Extra sessions continue to take place on a Tuesday after school and we would encourage all Year 11 students to attend. Students are being given a revision list produced by the exam board, which directs their revision to specific topics. We would encourage every Year 11 student to use Hegarty to help with revision and would suggest they revise little and often. Revision sessions will also be available during the Easter break.

SCIENCE

This term the Year 8s have been learning about Patterns in Chemistry. They have excelled at forming word equations!

Along with their normal studies the Year 8s took their mid-year assessments, some of these in the main exam hall and some in the classroom. The students were impeccably behaved during this time and were a credit to the school. By the time the students sit their GCSEs they will be pros!!

Along with their studies and assessments the students have taken part in a wide range of extra curricular activities. One of those clubs is STEM club, this is where the students come and discover science in a fun, practical way. It is open to all Year 7 and 8 students, in Lab2 on a Wednesday after school. This term they have extracted DNA from a strawberry, built spaghetti and marshmallow towers and as seen in these pictures made animated spinners.



MFL

Year 7 students have enjoyed studying the celebrations of New Year in both France and Spain. Upon returning to school in January, pupils studying Spanish and French studied how Spain and France celebrate the Epiphany on the 6th January.

This proved to be a popular topic as celebrating this feast in France and Spain involves eating a lot of cake. Some lucky pupils even got to eat a portion of "Galette des Rois" or "Roscon de Reyes" !

Our Year 7 students have also completed their first set of exams in MFL, with a number of students performing brilliantly. Well done!

MUSIC



Year 11 have shown determination and ambition in successfully planning and putting on their own concerts for younger students.

It is fair to say they found this quite stressful, having to work with a lot of different adults and students and think on their toes while adapting to the ever-changing list of performers available, but they worked together well, supporting and helping each other and have spent considerable effort in getting their portfolios of evidence ready for presentation.

These final year students are now busy improving their playing techniques and starting to prepare their final performance pieces, covering a whole range of styles from Green Day to Sean Mendes, and classical Spanish guitar to Jazz and R&B.
