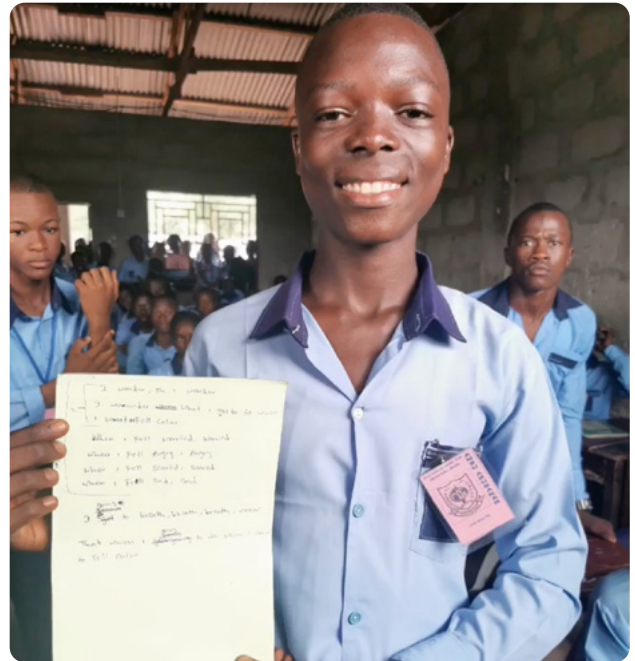
We will remember them.

DRAMA

Year 9 Drama

ENGLISH

This term has been busy for all year groups. Years 10 and 11 have been recording soundbites for the upcoming performance of Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol. Seventy students from Years 10 and 11 will be visiting the Shakespeare North Playhouse theatre to watch the show. Additionally, over a hundred of our Year 8s will be visiting the theatre for a spooky reading or two of Shakespeare's famous ghost stories. Our first set of students won their tokens to vend a book from our book vending machine. Vending a book is free; to win, students are nominated by their class teacher to enter the prize draw.

As the end of the first term fast approaches, I wish to celebrate the fabulous gothic work year 8 have been doing in English. During the term they have read a challenging text: Twelve Minutes to Midnight. A novel set in the Victorian

Era. Through their study of the novel, they have started to understand gothic archetypes and Victorian life which lays the foundation for when they study A Christmas Carol in Year 10. Students have explored vocabulary linked to Gothicism and written their own frightful tales which would be welcomed in the pages of The Penny Dreadful!

Here are some fabulous gothic descriptions from our students:

HUMANITIES

Year 9

Students in Year 9 have been working well since September as they begin to think about which Humanities subjects, they will pick as option subjects to study for GCSE.

In Geography, pupils have been learning about India. Pupils have learnt about the challenges and opportunities of living in Mumbai, a mega city.

In History, pupils are looking at the reasons for WWII and the impact of WWII on Britain, including studying the Blitz and Evacuation.

In RS pupils have sensitively studied The Holocaust and they have undertaken their learning in a mature manner appropriate for such an important topic. They will look in more detail at The Holocaust in future history lessons.

Year 11

In Humanities, Year 11 have made a wonderful start to their final year in The Prescot School.

In History, pupils are studying Germany in the aftermath of WWI and learning how and why Hitler rose to power.

In Geography, topics covered since September include revisiting field work skills and learning about coastal processes and landforms.

In RS, pupils have been learning about religion and ethics. They have been discussing sensitive and thought-provoking topics such as Euthanasia and Abortion.

The recent mock exams have taken place, and pupils' behaviour and effort in these exams was very positive and we hope Humanities students continue to work to the best of their ability going forward.

All three subjects offer revision sessions after school to support pupils and fill any gaps in knowledge. These sessions are well attended, and we welcome everyone to join us.



MATHS

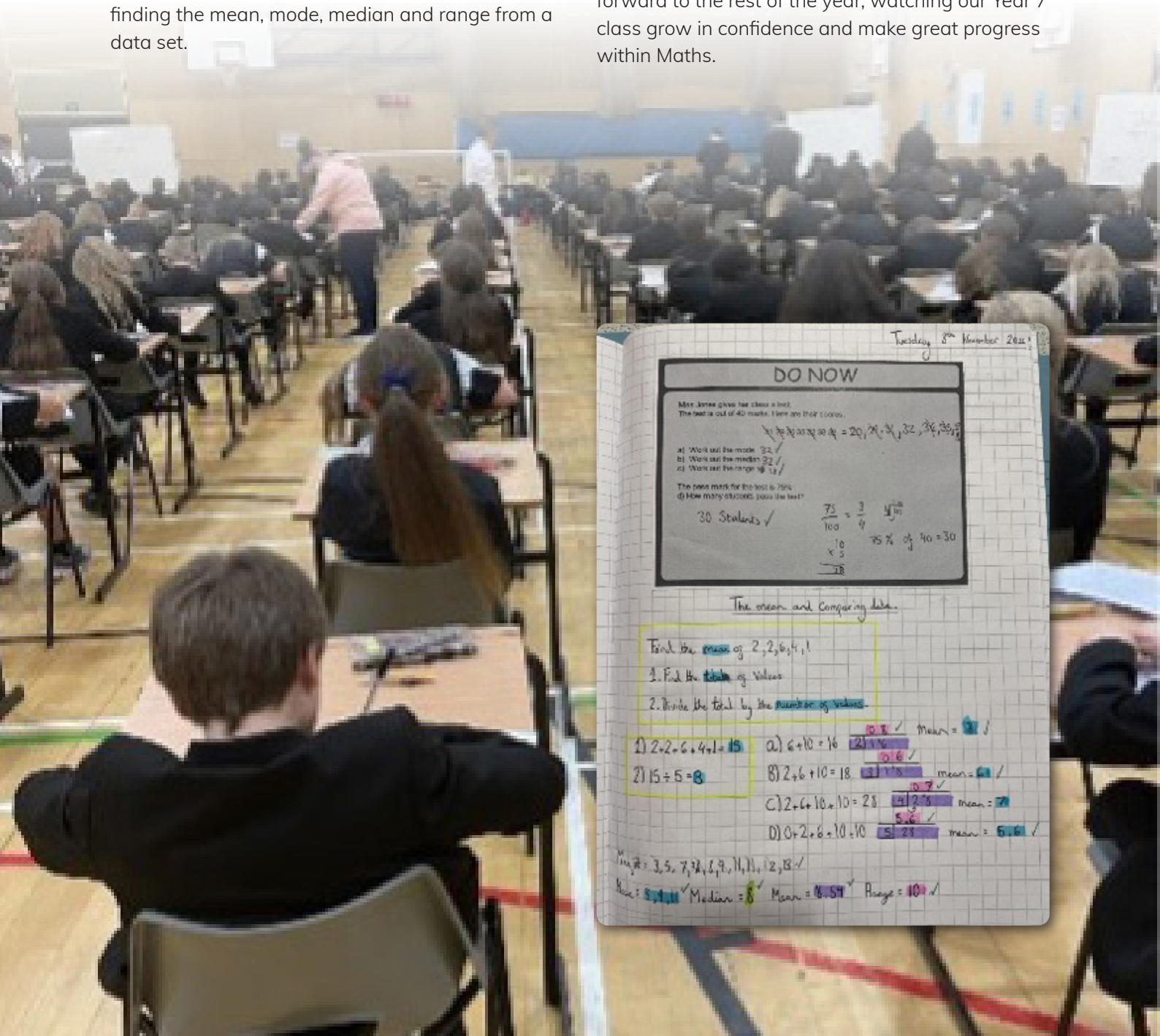
Year 7 Maths

It has been lovely to welcome our Year 7 students into Maths this year. They have coped well with the transition from primary to secondary. We started the year consolidating our number skills, stretching and challenging our students further, moving onto data afterwards.

The quality of the work produced has been to a high standard and students are taking pride in their work. They have produced some excellent work on finding the mean, mode, median and range from a data set.

Our Year 7 students have recently sat a Maths exam in the hall to prepare them for their GCSE's. This seemed quite daunting, however they handled the pressure excellently and completed their exams successfully.

In class, some students initially felt a little awkward answering in class, worried about getting answers wrong in front of their peers. However, when visitors have been in classrooms, they have commented on the positive atmosphere and the quality of discussion taking place within the department. The Maths team are really looking forward to the rest of the year, watching our Year 7 class grow in confidence and make great progress within Maths.
