PRESCOT STAFF 'WORK TOGETHER TOWARDS AMBITIOUS GOALS' SAYS OFSTED Ofsted raising standards improving lives

Ofsted visited Prescot just before the summer holidays for a monitoring visit, following our last full graded inspection in September 2021.

As part of their visit, inspectors reported that 'across all areas, you have devised appropriate strategies and well-focused plans. These are successfully helping all leaders and staff to work together towards the same ambitious goals.'

The report continued 'you have increased the number of staff to reduce and better manage their workload. You have allocated appropriate dedicated time for staff to work on key priorities. You and other leaders provide effective opportunities for staff to keep you informed of their training needs.'

In other feedback, 'subject leaders and teachers have been supported well to improve their curriculum thinking' leading to 'pupils feel that teachers introduce and explain ideas that help them to know and remember more.'

Inspectors also noted that, in relation to SEND, 'staff have been supported to better understand the different types of pupils' needs and to develop

practical approaches to supporting these pupils in lessons' and pupils have noticed that teachers are getting better at providing support to individuals through different explanations, modelling or breaking down the activities that pupils do.'

Improvements to expectations and systems to promote better behaviour were also highlighted, meaning that 'As a result, staff believe that pupils are much calmer and are developing increasingly positive attitudes to school. Pupils agree. Staff's higher expectations are helping more pupils to behave well and to show respect to others.'

We were also pleased to have our work on careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) for Years 7 to 9 praised, with the report stating 'Pupils appreciate the greater number of opportunities that they are getting to explore their next steps in education or employment through subject lessons and wider whole-school events.'

Mrs Cousineau, Head of School, said: "This is a fantastic report that acknowledges all the hard work undertaken by our dedicated team is having a marked impact upon the learning outcomes for our students."

"We will continue on our journey to excellence with unflagging enthusiasm, pace and purpose, celebrating the important milestones we are reaching along the way and continuing to demonstrate to Ofsted that we have what it takes to provide the very best for our school and our community."

ENGLISH

The students were then given the opportunity to act out scenes from Hamlet in a similar format. The session was thoroughly enjoyed by all; the students were again complimented on their positive attitude to learning by staff at Shakespeare North.

Shakespeare's First Folio

This is not the only visit to Shakespeare North this term. On 7th November, a group of Year 7 students were given the amazing opportunity to preview the First Shakespeare Folio at Shakespeare North as part of the partnership we have with the theatre.

This exclusive opportunity allowed the students to preview the rare First Folio and participate in a workshop specifically designed to support knowledge and understanding of Shakespeare's works. Miss Whewell was extremely proud of the students who took part in the workshop with theatre staff commenting, 'the students were an asset to the school.' Well done Year 7!

Debate Mate 2023-24

This term marks the launch of Debate Mate 2023/24, a programme of extracurricular debate workshops aimed at increasing speaking and listening attainment and improving a range of higher-order thinking skills and non-cognitive abilities such as confidence, teamwork, and leadership.

A special mention goes to Ade, Year 8, and Patrick, Year 11, who promoted the club by speaking in assembly. Students who have enrolled in the club visited Liverpool John Moores University, where they met with Debate Ambassadors and gained insights into the exciting opportunities ahead.





MATHS

In Year 7, the students began the academic year by settling in exceptionally well. The initiation of the learning journey included a baseline assessment to identify areas of strength and areas for development for both the year group and individual classes.

Progressing forward, they engaged with the Key Stage 3 curriculum, starting with Number Skills, followed by Analysing and Displaying Data.

The Number Skills unit focuses on developing and solidifying the learning they acquired in primary school, ensuring a strong foundation for the academic year ahead. The students then directed their attention to Analysing and Displaying Data,



building on their prior knowledge of averages but in more complicated contexts such as grouped data and problem solving.

In the second half of the Autumn term, Year 7 students embarked on a journey to deepen their understanding of algebra and its application in problem-solving using formulas.

ART & PHOTOGRAPHY

Year 8 students have been investigating other cultures and celebrations.

They have developed their skills based on the research of the Mexican festival, Day of the Dead. The students have learnt about traditions,

how different cultures celebrate different occasions and cultural representation and iconography. The project is based mostly on the artistic elements of colour and pattern. The students have developed skills in graphics and been introduced to printing processes and techniques.



MFL

Year 9 students have worked well in MFL this term and continue to progress in their language studies.

Continuing their studies, students have focused on phonics, contributing to improved fluency and confidence in speaking. In French, the topics of healthy living, health problems, fitness and sport have been explored. In Spanish, they have focused on the topics of work and keeping in shape. Students completed assessments in November and their effort in these exams was encouraging. The results from this assessment were positive, boding well for the future and further language study.

PE & DANCE

PE Curriculum

Our students have spent the Autumn term taking part in sports such as football, netball, hockey, basketball and fitness. All students have engaged extremely well and are making good progress in their knowledge, understanding and performance in each sport. We look forward to our students showcasing their talents during our assessment period where they will engage in full context games of each sport. In the spring term we will begin new sports for students such as rugby, table tennis and trampolining.

Sporting highlights

The Prescot School has had a lot of fixtures during the Autumn term.

Year 8 Boy's Football team went the furthest in the ESFA National Cup, departing in the third round. The Year 9 Boys Basketball team continue their unbeaten run after winning against Kirkby in a friendly. Our girls' teams have taken part in fixtures and competitions across Knowsley in Football and Netball. Well done to all who took part!

We have clubs running for all; Netball, Football, Fitness and Basketball Students - Come along and get involved! After the Christmas break our extracurricular offering will change to new sports such as rugby and table tennis.

MUSIC

Our Year 8 students have been busy developing their keyboard skills and knowledge of blues music.

They have learnt to play the 12 bar blues chord sequence and are learning to improvise over the top, creating riffs using the 'blues scale'.

DRAMA

Year 9 Drama

This half term in Drama, the focus has been on performing monologues and duologues.

This approach provides students with the freedom to script and perform their own personal pieces, allowing them to create unique characters.

Confidence in performing has been steadily growing, with students enjoying spontaneous improvisation and hot seating activities.

The culmination of these efforts will be a final performance featuring their original work.

Performing solo requires great confidence, and the Year 9 students are embracing the challenge, impressing staff with their maturity and talent.








SCIENCE

It's been a term of exciting scientific exploration at The Prescot School!

Year 7 students have been exploring particles and some students used skittles to investigate whether food colourings diffuse quicker in cold or hot water. We related this to E numbers used in food production and discussed how some sweets and foods have a lot of different chemicals added to them.

Meanwhile, the budding scientists in Year 8 had their own fiery experiment while studying digestion and chemical reactions. The students learnt about the formation of compounds and made observations on the physical changes that take place during a chemical reaction.

Year 9 students have created some fantastic pieces of work, exploring how Florence Nightingale



played a pivotal role in shaping the public health system we have today. They specifically focused on how her contributions led to the establishment of the National Health Service.

Year 10 students have been studying diffusion, connecting back to previous learning. They conducted experiments using potassium permanganate crystals to observe the effect of temperature on diffusion rate.

CATERING

Students have been showcasing their practical achievements in the Level 2 Award in Hospitality and Catering.

The photos illustrate the impressive work of the last group, as they demonstrated a high level of skill and accuracy in preparing a two-course meal for a bistro.





The assignment's focus was on serving children and retired adults.

The excellent results of the practical exam highlight the skills mastered throughout the course.

PUPIL PREMIUM

School receives extra funding called 'Pupil Premium' for every child who is registered as 'free school meals'

We use this extra money to improve the educational provision and resources at the school.

This extra money could make a real difference to the quality of education we offer. You may wish to review how we use this additional funding by reading our pupil premium statement on our website. This means that even if you do not want to use your child's free school meal entitlement, you should still apply.

How do we use Pupil Premium Funding?

Pupil Premium Funding benefits every child in school, but specifically those whose families are eligible. Within school this year we have used some of our funding to:

- Provide specialist intervention.
- Reduce the cost of reward trips.

- Ensure children in every year group have had access to events at the Shakespeare North Playhouse.
- Employ two school-based counsellors.

BTEC ENTERPRISE

In our BTEC Enterprise course Year 10 students have been exploring local enterprises in the area and the entrepreneurs who own them. They have looked at what skills and characteristics are needed to make a business successful and how they can attract and retain customers. Currently, they are looking at how external factors can affect a small business by conducting a PEST analysis. They will also be looking at the internal factors using a SWOT analysis.

ICT

In Computer Science, our Year 10 students have been learning about hardware, software and storage, and how they play an important role in system architecture.

Students have looked at the Von Neumann model to demonstrate the way in which the Central Processing Unit, the Arithmetic and Logic Unit and the Control Unit interact with each other inside a computer. Additionally, they have also been looking at various methods of data storage and how data is represented using binary and hexadecimal.

ATTENDANCE AND PUNCTUALITY

It's really important to maintain good attendance and punctuality as missing school now means missing out on an important stage in life where many vital skills are developed, along with academic learning.
